# Syllabus of General English for Students of Library and Information Science, BA Fall 2017

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# **Course Description**

The overall goal of this course is to enhance student's skills of English. It, too, aims at enabling the students to read English materials related to their major, not to mention to prepare them to write in English for their academic requirements. The central focus of the course is on reading and writings skills; however, students will have this chance to improve their speaking and listening capabilities through presentations during the course.

#### **Attendance and Participation Procedures**

Additionally, all students have to deliver at least one ten-minute lecture on a topic— of their own selection and interest— to the class.

### **Activities and Assignments**

Class activities cover presentations by the students, joining in discussion, doing assignments delivered to you, among others. Assignments for the class include extra exercises on the materials as well as writing activities. Please don't hesitate to talk to me if you face in difficulty during the class or doing the activities.

#### **Meeting Content**

In each session, we try to focus on each language skills. That's said, the time limitation in each session would resulting in not being able to address all the skills in a similar manner. Therefore, the first sessions include discussion and reading and the second ones are tied to grammar and writing. Students' lectures are spread in all sessions. The main text book for reading is Baigent (2005) and extra materials are presented from the second source i.e. Driscoll (2008). To work on writing, we will use Baigent's (2005) book where she discussed writing skills. The grammatical points are presented based on the Azar's (2010) textbook which encompasses sufficient exercise on each grammatical point.

#### **Academic Honesty**

From the very outset, I have this assumption that students do not COPY and PAST their classmates' assignments and activities or CUT and PAST them from the Internet. This is called <u>plagiarism</u> which must be avoided in academia. But feel free to consult with your classmates and friends and seek their opinions. Group working is much appreciated if done properly.

#### Exams

For this course, you will have around 20 assignments, four quizzes, one midterm exam and one final exam. The information on the time of the quizzes and exams can be found in the table below. The quizzes, midterm and final exams will contain multiple-choice questions, cloze-tests, short answers as well as essay questions. They will be based on the materials we had in each meeting.
